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### WHITHER GOES THE CHURCH? -- Rev Canon Dele Agbelusi

There are various periods that become turning-points in the life of a church or in one's Christian life. They can be exciting times. They can also be painful times. The Church of England has been in the news recently and as expected, it's not the type of news to make you smile. So... I am sad, I am disturbed and I am burdened. At a time like this, it is of immense benefit to the soul to allow the Spirit of the Lord to provide counsel. I opened to the book of Malachi and there read about a people who were losing touch with the Living God - our present experience is very similar to this and it's not difficult to see this coming. If your love for the Lord is not as fervent compared to the love for him when you were first saved, then the handwriting may be on the wall. As I try to understand the arguments in the General Synod regarding the House of Bishops' proposal which fails to "1. critique the modern sense of self and individualism and the sexualisation of our society, which is leaving our children and young people confused and vulnerable; 2. provide a vision of the holy life in following Jesus as Lord", I discern problems ahead for the body of Christ within the Anglican Communion. Where do we go from here?

Filled with a sense of their own importance, Malachi presents a picture of the leaders and teachers in post-exilic Israel, easily becoming unteachable. Like these leaders in Malachi's days, we in the Church of England today are falling into a terrible danger of becoming so accustomed to ministering the Word of God that we have foolishly become closed to the Word Himself and blind to our own sins.

In Malachi 1: 6-14, we read about the symptoms of irreverence to the Lord. Malachi preempts any protestations of innocence. He says, "Are you going to ask how you have dishonoured God?" In other words, "Are you going to ask what is wrong in your worship and your practices? Then I will tell you". What was playing out were priests who despised the work God had given them to do and are more interested in their own agenda.

Perhaps we gasp at the incredible situation of Malachi's day. We are left asking, 'Well, how on earth had their hearts got this way?' It usually starts from one simple compromise until their guiding vision is lost in the guagmire of compromises. Israel's symptoms are present in embryonic form within ourselves. Our fear now is that such things as in Malachi's day are easily taking hold of us. We see how easily fellowships and churches can fall into the barren religion so graphically described by Malachi, where the priests had forgotten the greatness of God. They had forgotten that their God, their Master was none other than "the Lord Almighty". He's the one who declared that "My Name will be great among the nations." (Malachi 1.11).

Looking at what God was saying to these priests (Malachi 2: 1-9), we must realise that He will judge us for the influence that we exercise upon other people. John Benton says "for the counterfeit Christian, or the counterfeit leader, who has only confirmed the world's prejudice against God's people, there will be a terrible judgement."

It is very rare for the spirituality of a group of Christians to exceed that of its leaders. That is a true observation from life that should make all those who aspire to leadership think twice and perhaps tremble. It is my prayer that God will help us to discern the times, humble ourselves, seek His face and pray, so that "our land" may be healed.

Jude writes to all believers to contend earnestly for the faith. A true contender vigorously endeavours to win the competition, not holding anything back. In this case, the struggle is for "the faith," which is the saving truth of Jesus Christ and His teachings (2 Corinthians 11:3-4; 1 Thessalonians 2:13; Hebrews 1:2). And since this faith was "entrusted to God's holy people," all believers, not just Christian leaders, are called to defend the truth of Jesus Christ. And since this faith was entrusted "once for all," Jude intends to stand against those who claim to receive "new" revelations of truth. Through Christ's personal teachings and the work of the Holy Spirit, Jesus has already given the full message of truth to the apostles (John 14:26; 16:12-13). Paul gives a similar warning not to let anyone pervert the gospel of Christ with *new* and different teachings (Galatians 1:6-9). God has spoken, and any *new*, continuing, or special revelations of "truth" are to be rejected.

The two basic false teachings Jude contends with are stated in Jude 1:4: "For certain individuals whose condemnation was written about long ago have secretly slipped in among you. They are ungodly people, who pervert the grace of our God into a license for immorality and deny Jesus Christ our only Sovereign and Lord." First, Jude opposes the false teachers in their sanctioning of immoral behaviour—they "pervert the grace of our God into a license for immorality." Second, Jude calls them out on their rejection of the deity of Christ—they "deny Jesus Christ our only Sovereign and Lord."

The faith entrusted to God's holy people for which they must contend is grounded in Jesus Christ. This faith is expressed through holy living to which all believers are called (Leviticus 20:7; 1 Peter 1:16; Romans 6:1-14; 12:1).

Guided by the Holy Spirit, Jude writes to encourage his readers to aggressively defend the faith that the apostles taught. The core of these teachings are complete, so Jude writes that "the faith ... was once for all delivered to the saints" (Jude 1:3). The primary aspects of God's truth had been revealed. The apostates might subtract from or add to those teachings, but to do so was to corrupt the pure Word of God.

Jude had a change of mind regarding what he wanted to write about. At first, he intended to address matters pertaining to salvation. Instead, he feels led to tell his readers to aggressively defend the faith—the truths the apostles had given to believers. What brought about his change of mind? The answer is divine inspiration: the act by which the Holy Spirit guided the writers of Scripture to write only what He wanted them to write.

In most parts of the world, Biblical, orthodox Christianity is returning to the position it held before the rise of the European church-state complex we call Christendom. We are living in the wake of **its** collapse. This is a frightening reality for some but our hope is where it has always been in the promise of Jesus our Lord. The Lord assures us that the

gates of hell shall not prevail against His Church. No movement, not Gnosticism, Moralism, Revisionism, Romanism, or Islamism can alter our Lord's plans for his church and for the nations.

Maranatha. Come Lord Jesus.
